Thought For The Weeks: November is upon us already, in what normally is a busy period for many of us. However we are invited by the Church to pause to consider the Holy Souls in purgatory. There is a lovely custom in some countries, on the feast of All Saints, to visit the cemetery to pay one's respects for deceased members of one's family, as well as friends. In this country we do this as well, at other times, perhaps not so often as we would like. However visiting the deceased, even All Souls day, or with fellow parishioners, means that we pray for the eternal salvation of the deceased and, if they are in purgatory, that they may be purified and released from that place, so that they can enjoy the beatific vision of God for all eternity. This is the ultimate goal of our lives on earth, the reason for our existence - to know God and to be happy with Him in the next life. We can help the Holy Souls in purgatory by our prayers, especially the rosary, but above all by having Masses said for them. If we want friends in heaven to pray for us, then perhaps we could gain a multitude of them by helping to ease the Holy Souls journey out of purgatory. No doubt they will 'eternally grateful'.


GREGORIAN CHANT PRACTICE

Aid to the Church in Need


On Wednesday 28th of November we are uniting with Aid to the Church

The Basilica of St. John Lateran – Rome. Founded in the 4th Century in honour of St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist, St. John Lateran is the Cathedral of Rome and the most important of the four major Basilicas. It is known as St. John Lateran Archbasilica as it is considered the mother church of Roman Catholic faithful. In the early part of the 4th Century the Laterani family were stripped of their land, as one of their members was accused of conspiring against the Emperor. It was given to the Bishop of Rome in order to build the first Roman Basilica. Throughout the centuries, St. John Lateran has survived several fires and an earthquake in 897. Nevertheless, it still retains its first form even though it has been reconstructed on several occasions. Near the Basilica was a monastery which has now completely disappeared, the only part standing being its beautiful cloister from the 13th century. St. John Lateran also houses a baptistery which for many years was the only baptistery in Rome. The Basilica has played an important role throughout history. It was here that all popes were enthroned until 1870. The central doors of the Basilica made of bronze were previously used at the Roman Senate House within the Roman Forum. The Holy Stairs (Scala Santa) are located close to the Basilica. These are renowned because it is believed that Our Lord climbed these very steps during His Passion. Indulgences:

When considering certain of the Commandments we see that before certain sins can be forgiven, the injury done by them must be repaired. An indulgence is the remission by God of the temporal punishment (spiritual debt) due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven. An Indulgence is not a pardon for sin, permission to commit sin, exemption from sin nor the purchase of the release of a soul from Purgatory.

It was the custom of the early church for sinners to receive severe penances for their sins.

These lasted for a considerable time, even for years in some cases.

Often the penitents went to those about to be martyred who gave them letters interceding with the bishop for a remission of the penance which has been imposed in consideration of the suffering the martyr was about to endure.

When the persecutions ceased, the bishops still continued to remit the canonical penances as we know from many writings and the decrees of several councils.

From the 8th century on the severe penances of the early Church were changed into prayers, fasting, pilgrimage almsgiving and such like.

There can be no doubt that indulgences are a great stimulus to holiness within the Church.

St. Alphonse Liguori (1696-1787) says that to become a saint, nothing more is needed than to gain all the indulgences one can.

Indulgences develop a sense of solidarity among Catholics by reminding us of the Communion of Saints, the Doctrine of the Mystical Body and the infinite merits of Christ's redemption.

The obviously encourage prayer, fasting and almsgiving and they incite us to receive the Sacraments of Penance and holy Communion more frequently.
